

The Holy Spirit:

The Friend who is Cheering you on

I have a friend who, a few years back, gave me a fluffy pom-pom to clip onto my bag. She said it was to remind me that she was cheering me on, like a cheerleader waving a pom-pom to support a sports team. Eventually the pom -pom came unattached whilst I was out and was lost. But I knew that she would continue to support me as a friend, even if there was no visible sign of it.

It's great to have friends, but sometimes they can let you down. There may be times when we feel lonely and abandoned, times when nobody seems to truly understand our situation.

As followers of Jesus we always have one friend who will never let us down: The Holy Spirit.

Jesus' first group of friends on earth were fearful when he said he was leaving them to return to his heavenly home. This was his reply to them in John 14: 15 - 21:

¹⁵ 'If you love me, keep my commands. ¹⁶ And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you for ever – ¹⁷ the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be^[a] in you. ¹⁸ I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. ¹⁹ Before long, the world will not see me any more, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live. ²⁰ On that day you will realise that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you.

²¹ Whoever has my commands and keeps them is the one who loves me. The one who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love them and show myself to them.'

The first disciples had been so close with Jesus that for him to leave felt to them like they were losing a father, as if they were being orphaned. He tells them that he will send them an 'advocate' in his stead.

What Jesus is talking about is the Holy Spirit, the third part of the Godhead, along with himself and the Father. We refer to the Holy Spirit as 'he' because he is one of the three persons of the Trinity. The word that Jesus uses for the Holy Spirit is sometimes translated as 'advocate', 'comforter', 'helper', 'counsellor', 'encourager' or simply 'friend'.

This holy friend, standing in the stead of the physical Jesus, is only the intimate of those who have placed their trust in Jesus. He has been active since the creation of the world, but was granted to all believers at Pentecost, the birth of Christ's Church. Whilst those who don't yet know Jesus may get a 'natural' sense of God's right and wrong through their consciences, sadly, they do not have this gift that we do.

The Holy Spirit lives with us and in us, he teaches us, he reminds us of Jesus' words, guides us and can give us insight into future events.

Unlike my pom-pom friend, however, who has a definite tendency to only talk about the good things we have done and not the bad things, the Holy Spirit will not cheer us on and encourage us regardless of any decision we make or any course of action. One important function of the Spirit is to convict us of sin, to show us when we're going wrong. He will guide us towards the good that God intends for us and against the bad that the enemy would like.

Nevertheless, the Spirit continues to be the perfect friend who will never leave or abandon us; with us wherever we are and whatever we're going through. He is the only one who can give us a peace that passes all understanding, not dependent on circumstances. He is always cheering us on, is always our backer, always our champion. How wonderful! Thank God for him and ask for his presence to be with you today and forever.





I wanted to share some thoughts and ideas at this point through a magazine article prior to what will be shared more formally to members after the summer.



I think we're on the edge of some exciting times ahead with changes in both how we 'view' church and how we 'do' church.

Post COVID in many churches there has been a move from many people helping out in lots of areas to churches, big and small, struggling to find enough support to run the groups and activities they managed to run before COVID. COVID seemed to be a time when some re-evaluated their time and how they were using it and quite often the church seems to have been where cutbacks were made.

Over the years PABC has been well supported but its membership and friend of the church in everything practical, both small maintenance activities to bigger projects like the Friendship Lounge.

In recent years that had been falling onto the shoulders of a few and even worse a reducing few to the point where the few were in danger of imploding under the burden.

Recently we have, as a church leadership, moved outwards a bit and re-created teams for many of the tasks and groups of tasks we need to manage.

Over the summer there is a paper being prepared that will bring together all the tasks that are needed to to run the church and keep it going. This brief introduction is just to get you all thinking about just how church works and functions behind the scenes.

We are looking for everyone to be thinking about how they can help in spreading the workload and expanding the areas that we would like to develop.

It would be great if all Members were able to really get involved and to be a key part of an active memberhip – there is space for everyone to be a driver (in some area) and not a passenger.

As part of the leadership, I am pointing the finger at myself to a fair degree as it is partly our own fault as a leadership team.

At times it seems easier to just get on with tasks rather than explaining what is needed, how others can help, and helping others get familiar with what needs doing and how to do it - and perhaps the most challenging point is being willing to let others do it in their way and letting them have their spin on how things are done and not expecting everything to be done the same old way.


Included in our forthcoming drive to expand the teams is much better information on what we do, how we do it and how we communicate – many of us are ignorant of


I am hoping this article will encourage you to be thinking about your involvement and the contribution you can make to Gods work wiring PABC and beyond that into mission in and around our area.

Avoiding kissing the gunners daughter.


Always letting his wind blow free.

A message from our Treasurer



We finally have a QR Code for online donations!

This QR code can be used from here, and it will soon be available on our website and publicised in the Church. The code links to PABC's own page with a trustworthy fundraising organisation 'Stewardship', with whom the Church has had an account for several years. It will be particularly useful for those who want to make one-off or occa-

sional donations.

Using the QR code with your mobile phone or ipad/tablet camera will link you directly to our giving page. Stewardship charge 4% as an administration fee for gifts given through their site, so for every £1 given, the Church will receive 96p. There are many online fundraising providers, but all charge a percentage and is a fair charge for the administration 'Stewardship' provided through the site.

If you are a UK tax payer, you can also make Gift Aided donations via 'Stewardship'. For every £1 donated with gift aid 25p will be added and 4p will be deducted, so the Church will receive £1.21.

The QR code will be particularly brilliant for visitors who wish to make a donation/gift to the Church while with us. Do feel free to try it out, as I have already done to ensure it worked!

Please note, however, if you are a regular worshipper it is far better to make your tithes and offerings (as we are prayerfully encouraged to do) directly into the Church bank account. By doing this your gifts can be reliably and regularly received and will not incur any deduction for the administration charge. If donating via the Church bank account, please do let me know if you are a UK tax payer because giving with Gift Aid is an added and valuable bonus.



Zoom Boys Club

Our weekly club for boys has now been running for 6 months and we have completed 2 terms. It has been a fun experience for all and lots of lessons learnt along the way – never a dull moment and lots of fun.

We started small with just 4 to 6 boys attending, grew to 14 names on the register with 11 or 12 attending most weeks then in the summer term lost one or two and ended up with between 5 and 8 most weeks.

We have plenty of room for more and delayed a recruitment drive till after the summer when we hope to reach out to schools around our area to grow our numbers. We have a good team of leaders and helpers with 4 of the leaders sharing the programme each week — the once-a-month preparation and programme responsibility is helping avoid burnout.



Some of the leaders involved early on have had to withdraw due to changes in work schedules and so we are a little light on support on Thursday evenings but for now have just enough – to meet the expected growth we will need more especially if we divide our weekly programme into two age streams to better meet the needs of the wide age range attending.

Most involved have found it quite challenging work – a boys group is much more difficult and demanding than a girl's group – but do not make that a reason not to help – despite the challenges it us also rewarding and the lads attending are nice.

Speak to Michelle or Ian to find out more and to explore where you can help – part time options will always be available. The older lads have embarked on a computer course led by Robert and they have enjoyed it so far.

A final challenge is to men within the wider church family (or male friends of church family) – we have mainly ladies now helping and leading and the

boys can really benefit from some male input and involvement and role models so gents please be seeking out how you can be part of this great work.



Enfold

'Thank you for making me feel so welcome when I come to the church on Thursdays, I really feel God is with me when i go` ` Enfold is like church to me`. These are just two comments we have received in recent weeks at Enfold and it has been really good to see how our guests are progressing with their faith. We are also seeing God answer prayers which is brilliant especially as a lot of our guests (and team) have been facing some really difficult circumstances recently. We have been studying the story of Abraham and are currently looking at David which has prompted some interesting discussion. We are also trying to be more intentional in sharing good news and asking for prayer

which people have been shy to do in rest of the group but privately have been very open in doing both.

For those of you who don't know what Enfold is, we are a church run group which starts at 9am on a Thursday morning and finishes around 11. We are open to all but especially the homeless and vulnerably housed and we start off each session with a reflection from the Bible, we then have breakfast together and various agencies such as Peabody and the NHS are on hand



to offer advice. We also have clothes that people can take and usually some items of food people can take away with them too. One of the most important things though is we try to have a team member responsible for going to each of our guests and chatting to them and building that relationship and opportunity to talk about what God has and could do for them.

I also must just say how wonderful the team is and they all go that extra mile for our guests.



NEVER AT PIER AVENUE!!

He said hello to people as they walked in but was greeted with cold stares and dirty looks from people looking down on him and judging him. He sat in the back of the church and listened to the church announcements for the week. He listened as new visitors were welcomed into the church that morning but no one acknowledged that he was new. He watched people around him continue to look his way with stares that said you are not welcome here. Then the elders of the church went to the podium to make the announcement. They said they were excited to introduce the new pastor of the church to the congregation. "We would like to introduce you to our new Pastor." The congregation stood up and looked around clapping with joy and anticipation. The homeless man sitting in the back stood up and started walking down the aisle.

That's when all the clapping stopped and the church was silent. With all eyes on him, he walked up to the altar and reached for the microphone. He stood there for a moment and then recited so elegantly, a verse from the bible. In my 50 years at sea I have weathered many storms but I thought I would tell you about this one in particular which quite ruined our day

Prior to this storm we had spent a several days alongside in SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA loading deep water underwater telephone cable for the southern US to EUROPE link. Incidentally, quite the most expensive cargo I have ever carried!

We sailed on the Monday evening and steamed slap bang into a cyclone the following morning, Janet's birthday. There was no warning a Tropical Revolving Storm was coming although the weather had been slowly deteriorating through the evening/early morning. Had we known there was a TRS lurking about we could have maybe dodged round it or safer still, stayed alongside. However..... Tuesday morning saw us steaming into a dark gunmetal grey sunrise with spray rattling against the bridge windows like musket balls; the bridge window wipers struggling to keep them clear. As the day progressed we blundered deeper into it like a blind man until it burst over us in the early hours of the morning and for four days we were pounded by wind and waves.

It can be hard to imagine what it was like during those four days and three nights. The well ordered ranks of grey beards caped with cold, white foam marching out of the gloom to hurl themselves against the bow surging across the foc'sl with rank after rank marching in to replace those already spent; the bow lifting, water pouring out of the freeing ports before plunging like a prancing pony into the next wave, the hull flexing and creaking with us wondering if the ship would break up as she flexed. A very real worry with the age of the vessel and in those conditions we would not be able to take to the boats! Fact slap; every week, somewhere in the world, a ship 'disappears' with the loss of all hands due to suspected hull failure or crew negligence.

However, we sailed on through the storm into the 'eye-of-the storm' a calm area in the centre of the storm out the other side at reduced main engine RPM which gave us a few hours respite for in the 'eye' the wind drops away nothing. However, it was not really safe to go out on deck to assess the damage as we were continually swept by high seas but we had to ascertain any damage, especially hull integrity. So out on deck m'boys with a life-jacket and a safety harness clipped to the hand rails. There was no wind although the seas continued to run high washing over us. However it gave us the chance to box-off the accommodation and get something hot to eat. Gradually the weather abated as we steamed out of it.

During the storm we were rolling through 60 degrees and sometimes in excess of that for our clinometers only registered to 30 degrees, and my Engine Room was off the scale at times! In addition I was thrown across the engine room several times it was

so bad. A very long couple of nights for us down below. We were rolling so much the main engine fuel filters had to be cleaned every 15 minutes because of years of accumulated sludge in the bunker tanks getting stirred up and blocking the filters. In addition there was water leaking into the auxiliary fuel system through the damaged tank vents which had to be continually drained off. It was very exciting out on deck as well, all hands on deck!



The lower blocks on both our cranes, each 50 ton capacity lift so a hefty piece of kit and, rather quite big..., broke loose and had to be secured, welding gas bottles broke free, 200 litre oil drums burst their lashings and split, spilling oil over the deck turning the deck into a skating rink and the Emergency Generator Room flooded when we were pooped by some very bad seas in quick succession losing all our emergency and essential/safety services as the switchboard tripped, ie. shut down. Our reserve fresh water tank was contaminated with sea water, the vent heads having been ripped off by the seas. A real disaster night and lucky none of us were lost overboard or injured. I got chased round the deck a couple of times by a rogue 200 litre oil drum and was washed off my feet several times while lashing loose gear down on deck and getting covered in battery acid when the emergency genny room flooded. Fortunately it was very diluted with all the sea water! However it did make the old skin tingle a bit and I had quite a few bruises to show for our action packed night.

The accommodation was a disaster area when I came up for a clean boiler suit with the main deck alleyway was awash with sea water which had leaked around the W/T door seals. My cabin was pretty good for I always kept it well secured for ready for sea. Just the papers from my desk and my books went flying. What a way to celebrate Janet's birthday!

However, we were in very serious situation as unbeknown to me; we had sea water in the generator fuel tanks which meant we could not run the aux diesel gen-sets. Earlier in the evening I had thought about changing over from the shaftgen to the aux gen-sets just in case, but I could not get them to parallel so I couldn't change them over. Despite my best shot something prevented me and I believe it was God in His own inimitable way preparing us for the days ahead as He knew we were going to have water contamination in our generator fuel tanks. The tank vents had been ripped off on deck were later found to be rotten causing the vents to fail allowing sea water to flood the tanks and contaminate the fuel. Mind you they were beautifully painted so you could not see the true condition. One hears about these things happening and I have often wondered how it could happen, but now I know. We were pooped several times in quick succession and the aft freeing ports could not shed the water fast enough so the deck was filled to the height of the bulwark so putting the vents under water and flooding the aux fuel system! The fuel tanks for the main engine work in a different way and we could handle the water ingress. I spent the fourth day running welding cables to the emergency switchboard and get our essential services back up and running. In the evening the weather started to moderate. As we slowly steamed out of the eye of the storm the plant settled down so we could get some sleep, mind you we were still rolling badly and I slept on the deck of the Machinery Control Room in my boiler suit wrapped up in a blanket just in case.....

This is such an exciting and fascinating story that the second half is being saved to be published in the October magazine.
